The 1867 Reform Act

Disraeli's support for the artisan vote Was dependent on its connection To multiple franchises, thus to promote His party at time of election...?

The crowds gathering to cheer Garibaldi as the hero Of Italian Unification: Saw how far from inclusion In the present Constitution they were; Until the patience that laid-off Mill-workers displayed was For Gladstone a revelation, And, when Palmerston died, For such men, enfranchised, the spur: But a rent-payers' exclusion, With Adullamite* collusion, Left the Liberals so deeply divided, That Gladstone, loath to tussle, Advised that Lord Russell resign. So, hungry and sad, when The crowds called for "Gladstone And Liberty", Disraeli decided To "dish the Whigs", he must see The Tory party re-align.

* But it was Gladstone's speech, That had "ventured..." to preach Political Devolution: That "Every man, not By some personal unfitness..." estranged, "Is morally entitled to come within The pale of the Constitution", Though not by "...sudden or violent Or excessive or intoxicating change"

But, on the Speaker's summons, The bill "to make the Commons More popular and independent", Was destined, on its way, To pass out of Disraeli's control: For 12 month-£10 lodgers Enfranchised by Hodgkinson's, Rent-rates 'compounding' amendment Put a million more borough artisans onto the electoral roll.

...Garibaldi's visit ~ Britain had helped Italian Unification; yet Italian constitution was more representative than their own ...mill workers behaved "responsibly" Mr. G: "....a shame & scandal that men such as these should be excluded from the parliamentary franchise".

...Adullamite: wing of Liberal party led by Robert Lowe v. further reform ~ "a sullen cabal cowering in...a small cave" (John Bright)

...Disraeli hoped to make Conservative Party electable, which they'd not been since Corn Law repeal & to dish ie defeat; see off the Whigs

By contrast in the counties, Just £12 and £5 pound lease-Holders were duly enfranchised, Meaning proportionately fewer Newer voters in county than town; And since, with boroughs Taking 20 of 45 seats, The next election proved a Liberal landslide, Disraeli to his chagrin Had failed to take Gladstone's crown.

For it was Gladstone's speech That brought within reach Political Devolution: That "Every man not....

Yet the bill, though not "small", Didn't warrant the call Of "a leap in the dark" by Derby: There was still no consistency In overall constituency size: And without a secret ballot for confidentiality "Persuasion" could still figure largely; And no way with ease, Even middle class M.P.s could rise: For still it would continue: No salary, no sinew, And though property was no longer needed, Campaigning was to cost Much as palms that had been crossed before; Universal manhood suffrage Required much greater leverage, And no female vote as yet conceded; While bills Commons might pass Still couldn't by-pass Lords.
